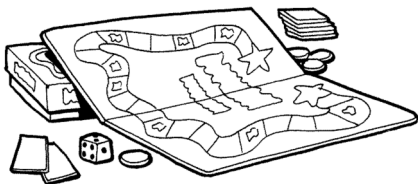

BAPTISM TESTIMONIES

On the evening of 24th July three people passed through the waters of baptism, these being Angela Michelmore, Karen Spinner, and Annie Mwampulo. All three were asked about their faith by Pastor Eric and here are the replies to some of those questions.

Angela Michelmore

“Tell us about the time when you asked Jesus to be your Saviour?”

It was 29 years ago, about a year before I accepted Jesus as my Saviour when I began to realise that I often thought and even said things that were wrong and I gradually became convinced that I was not always a very nice person. I know now of course that I was being convicted of my sin and have also learned that my daughter Belinda and her Bible study group were praying for me then. During that year while God was beginning to work in my life Belinda became quite ill and after her recovery she became very depressed.

It was a difficult time for the family, especially for David and myself as we could never leave her on her own. Unfortunately there were several afternoons when we both had to work and I asked Pat, her Bible study leader if she could look after her then. Pat was a really busy lady but it was quite amazing that God ensured that she was always available to have Belinda when we

needed her help. Whenever I collected her I was always invited in for a “cuppa.” I would firmly say “no thanks”, I didn’t want to get involved with all that nonsense! One day I had had a really rough time with Belinda, and also at my work and when I went for her I opened my mouth to say “no” yet again, to Pat’s invitation, but to my great surprise I found myself saying “Yes please”.

As I sat down Pat started to tell me about her daughter Gillian who had also been ill but had received Baptism of the Spirit. She explained that Gillian had actually fallen down at that time but had soon got up, smiling and well again.

I was intrigued and asked her to tell me more. She told me that Gillian had then accepted Jesus as her Saviour and was a different person, always laughing and happy. “I need some of that” I thought and asked Pat if anyone could receive the Spirit’s Baptism and how did it happen. “Oh that’s easy” she replied, “You just ask Jesus into your life and ask to receive His Baptism”. There and then she prayed for me, while I kept mutter-

ing “Yes please Jesus“. As I drove home I felt no different at first, then I suddenly started to grin and laugh and told Belinda that I was tingling all over, and it felt just as if every cell in my body was rejoicing, praising God and singing. “Mum you have been Baptised in the Spirit”, she said “Christ is now your Saviour”. We were both so happy that this

had happened, and also very pleased that He was gracious to me and did not let me fall down whilst I was driving!

That evening I prayed and asked Jesus into my life. I just cannot imagine now what my life would be like without Him.

Brief Background

I had an emergency baptism as a baby but didn't go to church as a child or adult until my late 30's. I joined a traditional C of E church as I didn't know or have any thoughts about other church services. I was confirmed into that church in my early 40's but then my faith was a Sunday's only faith as I only thought about being a christian on a Sunday.

How did I start coming to Stanway Evangelical Church?

Several years ago, Monica (who I had known for years through joint church services and our hobby/interest in cross stitching) came into Boots where I work. We chatted and she mentioned Stanway Evangelical Church and suggested I come along. I came along to the church the following Sunday. Monica had forgotten to tell me she was away for a quiet weekend with the ladies group at Sizewell. I was greeted warmly at

the door as I came in. One of the first people I spoke to was Audrey Fisher and she took me under her kind wing! We have been friends ever since.

The Change Started

During one of my early services taken by Kevin, this scripture was mentioned:

Matthew 7 v7-8

Ask and it will be given to you; seek and you will find; knock and the door will be opened to you.

For everyone who asks receives; he who seeks finds; and to him who knocks, the door will be opened.

This seemed to be exactly what I needed to hear at that time. I asked God to come into my heart and help me. God heard me and I was filled with his glorious golden light and wonderous love and then I knew my life was changed forever.

That was just the beginning. I came to church regularly and seemed to get a real buzz from the whole experience. I was drawn in by God's love in everyone in the

church. This real buzz I didn't experience from attending the traditional C of E church.

I became more aware of my faith, my prayers and the scriptures of the Bible. I came along to some of the prayer meetings on Wednesday nights. Later I joined the Bible Study group that was held at the church which was based on videos. After that I joined the Home Bible Study Group which first met at Stella and Tim's home. This Home Group gave me the opportunity for my faith to grow and have more understanding of the Bible. Gradually I gained the confidence to be able to speak at the group (which I wouldn't have been able to do in the past because of my shyness).

My faith has changed from Sundays only to a faith of every day where coming along to church weekly and praying has become such an important part of my life.

During this year at one of the Home Groups in February, we were discussing baptism. That night I had a message from God that he wanted me to be baptised. When I heard this message I was so overcome with excitement, joy and happiness as I believed that it was the right thing to do. I had no doubts at all that this was the right thing for me. I chose to be baptised so I could follow and obey God's teachings. I wanted God in my life forever know-

ing that He is my saviour and shows me everlasting love. He is always here for me which means so much to me now. Luckily my dear brother Mark and my nephew Adam were able to come down from Birmingham for my baptism, some of my friends came too as well as my church friends.

Before the baptismal service Eric and Adam explained what was involved during the actual baptism. I was more scared about speaking to a church full of people. I started off quite well but I was overcome with emotion when I was speaking about how God came into my heart, and I couldn't continue any more.

I feel so blessed that I was able to share my special day with Angela and Annie, who had chosen to be baptised on the same day. I shall remember my baptism for the rest of my life as it was so emotional, joyful and so special to me.

I wish to thank Eric and Adam for baptising me and Monica for recommending the church to me. I would also like to thank Audrey and everyone here at Stanway for all the kindness, support and love that they have shown to me. I feel so at home with everyone, like one big family together. You have all helped to change my life forever, which I will always be grateful for.

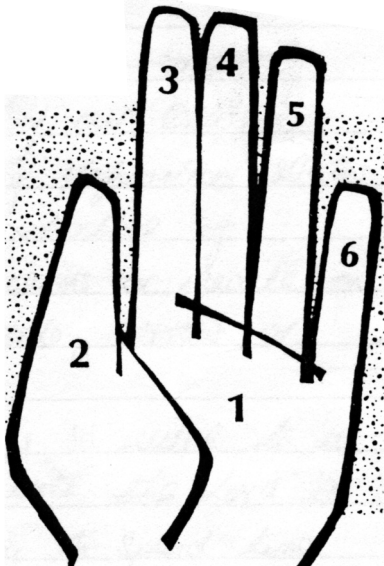

Although prayer is so vital to us in our relationship with the Lord, it is not always easy to spend time either alone or corporately without being distracted by thoughts, wandering or interruptions.

This article “Try your hand at prayer” was printed in the Fellowship Focus magazine (predecessor to The Lighthouse) in October 1986, the Church’s Centenary year, and I thought it might be a useful guide to us for our prayer life 25 years on.

The Mixing Bowl



I am aware that quite a few members of Stanway Evangelical Church are diabetic so thought it would be nice to have a different recipe besides the usual no sugar fruit cake. Marilyn and Graham kindly gave me a selection of diabetic recipes to choose from. I made this one for the July coffee morning and it got a favourable response from both diabetics and non diabetics.

Monica

Date and Walnut Loaf

8oz (225g) Chopped Dates
4oz (125g) Caster Sugar
A pinch of salt
1 level teaspoon Bicarbonate of Soda
2oz (50g) Margarine
6 fl oz (175ml) boiling water
1 beaten egg
2oz (50g) Chopped Walnuts
8 oz (225g) Self-raising Flour

1. Place dates, sugar, salt, bicarbonate and margarine in mixing bowl with boiling water and mix until margarine has melted. Leave to cool.
2. Add egg, walnuts and flour. Mix to a batter.
3. Line and grease 2lb loaf tin
4. Bake at 160C (325F) Gas 3, for approx 1 1/4 hours or until skewer inserted into the centre of the loaf comes out clean.
5. Turn out of tin and cool on wire rack.

This year has been really exciting for F2G, as we developed many new ideas for the group.

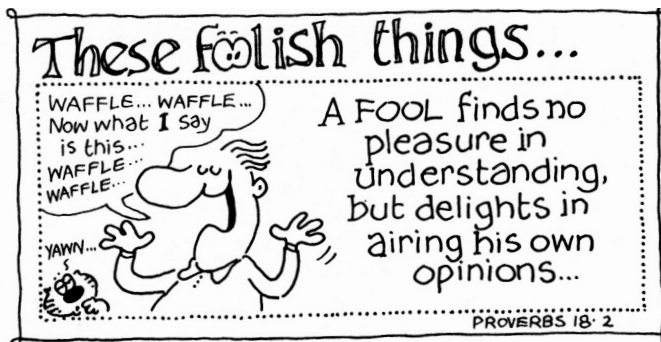

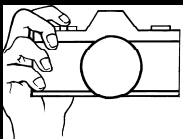

MISSION NEWS

In 1934 they began to publish a quarterly magazine which carried

By the time you read this article the summer activities will be over, holiday clubs, beach missions, camps and any other attempts to bring children and young people into a knowledge of the Lord Jesus Christ, and it is now that we need to concentrate our prayers for them, that they will retain what they have learned and that it will have a profound effect on their young lives forever. We need also to remember those who have given of their time and energies to run all of these activities from year to year.

With the world situation as it is today, the task of all the missions we support must be increasingly difficult, therefore making our prayers and practical giving more important than ever.

Please do make full use of the magazines and prayer diaries on the table in the Church lounge, these are very informative and helpful as a guide for your prayers.

Since I have been writing these reports I have begun to wonder where and how these missions came into being and have found some information on Medical Missionary News and thought it might be of interest.

MMN was commenced by a group of Christian doctors in 1922. These doctors had a concern for medical colleagues involved in missionary work overseas.

reports from the mission field and also gave information by which their missionary colleagues could keep abreast with progress in their profession.

Some of the early issues show that there are few funds being devoted to missionary medical work. The first issue included an urgent appeal for a stethoscope and a cheap watch to assist in pulse readings.

In 1947 the MMN fund was established with a sum of £400 to be used for charitable purpose for Christian missionaries and their dependants.

The first editor and administrator was Dr C Cox. After his death in 1963 a new fund was established with a capital sum of £2,000. This was to be used "for the purchase and maintenance of equipment and facilities for the relief of disease, sickness and suffering in association with the preaching of the gospel".

The main administrator was Dr Archie Hanton. From time to time limited practical assistance was given with the purchase of equipment, eg microscopes.

In 1977 Dr Hanton retired and invited one of the Trustees Mr Norman Lane to accept the position of Secretary/Treasurer. This was to be the beginning of a series of events which were to transform completely the scope of MMN.

An early letter which reached Norman was an inquiry from a missionary in Zambia as to whether a drug (no longer available in that country) could be obtained.

The drug was obtained and sent out by air mail to the great appreciation of the missionary concerned.

The good news quickly spread to other missionaries who were experiencing similar problems. Requests began to flood in to MMN and by 1980 consignments of up to five tons of drugs were being dispatched by air.

With his business experience Norman was aware of the advantage of container shipping and in 1982, using the facilities of his own factory, began to use containers to transport drugs, particularly to Africa.

Initially two container loads per year were sent. As the political situation in many countries deteriorated, medical missionaries, mission

hospitals and other missionaries have become more dependent on sources outside their countries for supplies, and that is where we come in with our practical giving and prayer support.

Many of us will remember Norman Lane and the tireless efforts he made for the work of MMN, his visits to the church to speak about the work in Africa and to collect bags of little knitted vests for the African babies. MMN has grown from strength to strength and now serves to bring aid and relief to many countries.

Please continue to support them and all the other missions in any way possible, especially in your prayers.

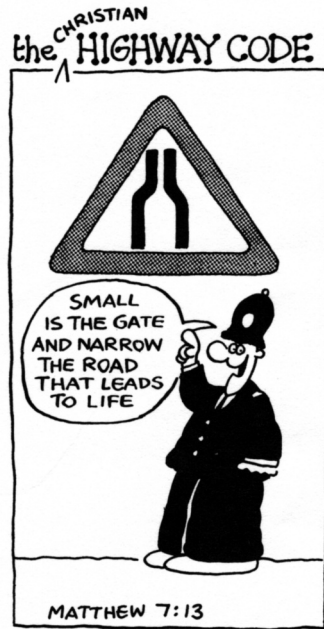
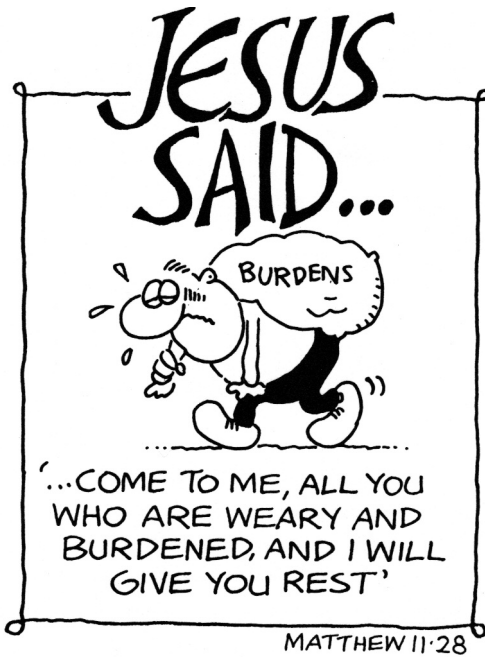


This is the name of the event for "Diabetes UK", and my third year in taking part in the five mile walk at Ipswich.

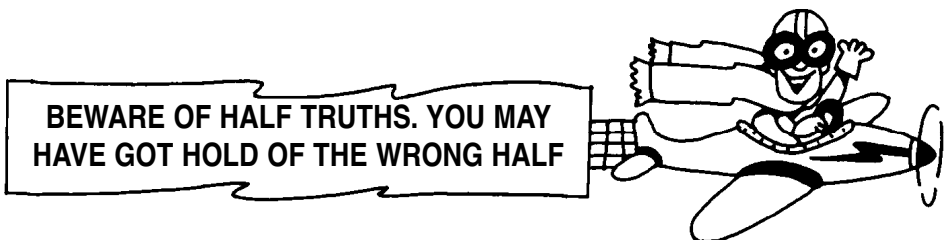

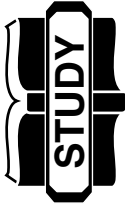
