Beyond the horizon

Recently Rachel Kerry and I had the opportunity to go into The Stanway School and work with a group of year 6 children (11 year olds). These children came from four local feeder primary schools and were children identified as being more able than perhaps others. The purpose of their day at the school was to give them a taste of what it was going to be like for them when they start in September. We were asked to lead a session on Epic Journeys related to an RE lesson. So Abraham was our focus (Genesis 12). Not long after this I went along with four others to Shoeburyness Evangelical Church to lead their Church Anniversary celebration on the Saturday evening. As we were wel-

comed the comment was made welcome to Shoeburyness "The end of the world". Whilst it is true that once at Shoeburyness there is nowhere else to go, it can hardly be described as the end of the world.

However travellers and explorers of old used to think that if you went beyond the horizon then you would literally fall off the edge of the world. At one time it was thought that the world was flat, we now know that the world is not flat but round, (well almost). Mankind has always had a desire to explore the unknown and to seek out new people and places. As each new continent, and each new people were discovered so people's understanding and perceptions changed. Many of these

journeys of discovery and exploration were undoubtedly of epic proportions. Often lives were risked and indeed many lost their lives as a result of venturing into the unknown. Yet as a direct result of the willingness of those epic travellers we live in a world where much is known, a world where virtually every part of it has been explored and discovered. Now in mankind's unquenchable appetite for adventure many billions of pounds/dollars the world over is spent in the quest to reach far into space, and as each discovery is made so our understanding and perceptions continue to be changed.

This is surely true of our relationship with God. Mankind was created to have an intimate ongoing relationship with Him. We see this clearly demonstrated in the Garden of Eden, when at the end of the day God would come and talk to His created beings, (Genesis 3:8) Adam and Eve. Of course what happened next is as they say history, but as a direct result of that one moment and act of disobedience the world became not flat nor round but crooked. Ever since that moment so long ago, mankind has been on a journey of epic proportions, a journey seeking to find meaning, truth and relevance to life. Yet sadly a journey that has taken us further and further away from the truth. The Bible is very clear as to the outcome of so much of our journeying, for

instead of bringing us closer to God, it has taken us further and further away from Him.

Why is this we may well ask, surely it is because we just lack understanding as to the true nature and personage of God. Just like the travellers of old it wasn't until they took that step of reaching out into the unknown that the reality of life beyond the horizon became a reality to them. These people, these places were and always have been there, it was just the fact that these things remained hidden until someone reached out. God has been and is always here, yet for many He remains a mystery. When the Lord Jesus lived on earth some two thousand years ago very few recognised Him as the Son of God.

John the Baptist did, pointing Him out to the crowds' saying "Behold (or look) the Lamb of God who takes away the sin of the world". When the disciples were asked by Jesus who people said he was, a variety of answers were given, ranging from Elijah to one of the prophets. Then when Jesus asked "Who do you say that I am" Peter rightly answers "You are the Christ of God" (Luke 9:20). Even though Peter had the right understanding as to who Jesus was, he still had a long way to go. It is as we follow Peter on his journey of discovery that we see his understanding of Jesus go beyond just words to a real desire and commitment of

love and service. Peter had many failures, he often acted rashly, made many mistakes, but in the end he got out of the boat, reached out to Jesus and was saved (Matthew 14:29). That was for Peter a pivotal moment and the beginning of his epic journey of following the Lord Jesus Christ as Saviour and Lord.

The question is this “Where does this all leave us”? Just recently we flew to America a journey of approximately 9 hours; whereas travellers of old took upwards of 3 months. It was because of the risks that they took that gave to us and countless others the opportunity of going to faraway places. When Jesus died on the cross it was and is the opportunity for all mankind to once again have that personal intimate relationship with God, to know for certain that we have eternal life, not just in dream land but in the reality of Heaven itself.

Man’s greatest journey is to know God, to trust Him, to worship Him, to serve Him. Peter had to get out of the boat; those ancient and modern explorers had to reach out leaving the safety and security of these and other shores. Only then did they find what lay beyond. We too must do the same, we must be willing to reach out to Jesus, saying as did Peter “Lord save me” (Matthew 14:30). Sometimes the journey will be hard, sometimes lonely, even frightening, yet one thing we can be sure of. We never journey alone, for

He (God) has promised never to leave us, (Joshua 1:5) nor do we need to fear what lies ahead. Psalm 23 is a Psalm of one young man’s epic journey, a journey that led him into a lasting relationship with the one true living God, a journey full of highs and lows, a journey of faith, trust and obedience.

May we all recognise that each of us are on a similar journey of epic proportions, and as we do so, let us not rely on our own abilities. Instead let us daily turn to Him (Jesus) the one who undertook the greatest of all epics, by leaving Heaven itself and becoming one of us, died for sin that He had never committed (2 Corinthians 5:21) and was raised again that we might be saved. May God grant each one the understanding to reach out to Jesus saying “Lord save me” that we too might embark upon the Journey of a Lifetime, for heaven itself awaits all those who are on this journey. Finally let us not cling hard to these shores but let us cast off and look towards Heaven knowing that there is a Saviour who waits to welcome us truly Home, for this is our goal; Heaven itself.

May God daily grant all we need as we journey ever onward.

Whilst having my six monthly check with my diabetic nurse in April, it was mentioned about my total weariness, but I laughingly put it down to having reached my 'seventies'. My comments, however were taken seriously and after a matter of weeks, various tests and visits to the hospital I was called to have an angiogram; the result of which proved to be quite serious - I needed heart surgery involving a triple by-pass.

Things still moved at considerable speed and on 19th July I was

successfully operated on in the Essex Cardiothoracic Centre in Basildon where I received exceptionally good care and attention. I can honestly say that throughout this short period of time I have been totally aware of God's undergirding love and people's prayers. It has been very humbling to be aware that so many people care about me and my family. I have received many, many cards of good wishes, flowers, gifts and numerous telephone calls for which I am most grateful. Above all I am so grateful that my heavenly Father knows about it all and assures me of His promise in Psalm 27:14 "Be of good courage, and He shall strengthen your heart".

Walk the extra mile for diabetes UK



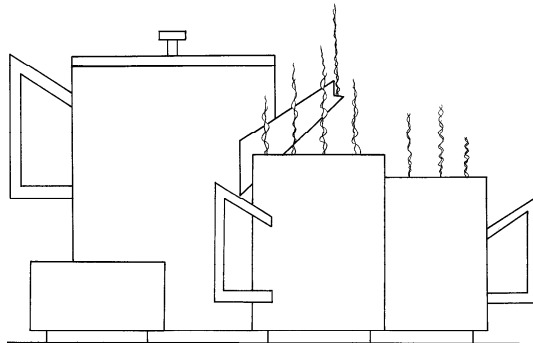

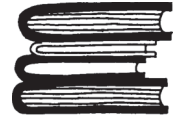

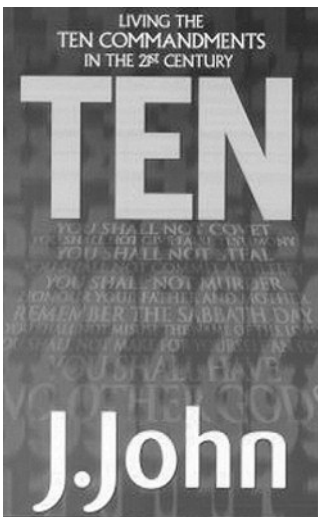

Sizewell Hall is England's most easterly, self catering, Christian conference and camping centre. Situated on the idyllic Suffolk Coast, the Hall has featured in recent TV historic dramas. Sizewell Hall is tucked away in an un-spoilt area of the Suffolk Coast, yet only 10 miles from the A12 Ipswich to Lowestoft road.

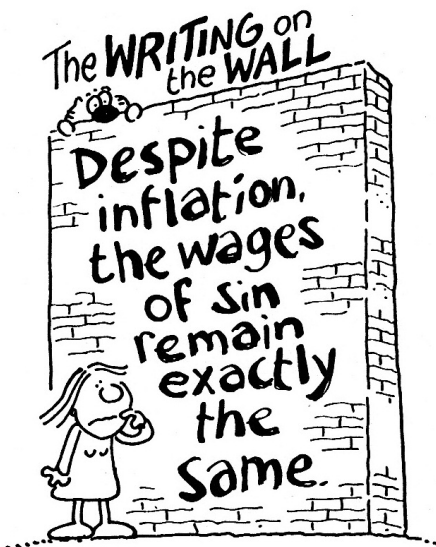
The accommodation comprises 32 bedrooms and 83 beds, fully carpeted and centrally heated. A large conference room, overlooking the sea, is fully equipped with audio visual aid equipment. The dining room has original oak panelled walls which can easily seat 83 people. The recently completed car park can accommodate nearly 50 cars. It

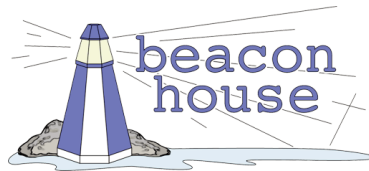

thrust my hands deep into my pockets, hoping to conceal their stains.

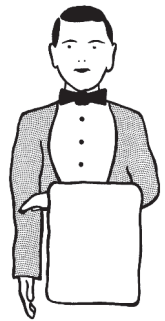

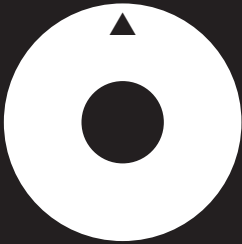

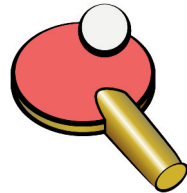
